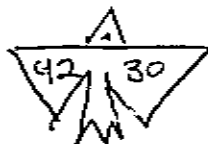
Silver Buffalo Number One was awarded to B-P. While pleased, he was even happier when he found out that Silver Buffalo Number Two was awarded

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## *Abstract*

The purpose of this research project was to establish an easily accessible guide to all of the BSA's Square Knot Awards. This information is not contained anywhere else in Scouting literature in a single volume. Likewise, there does not seem to be any color publication of all of the various knots. Publication of black and white depiction has led to confusion, and it is hoped that this project leads to clarity.

There are currently 31 such knots that may be worn on a Scouter's uniform. They include recognition of youth achievement, adult leadership, religious devotion, heroism, and specific honors.

This guide provides historical background, specifies the authorized manner of wear, has colored pictures of each knot, and includes the progress record or appropriate recommendation form for each knot. There is very little discussion as to the requirements for the individual knots. This information is covered in detail on each of the appropriate forms.

The information was gathered by reviewing a number of publications of and about BSA's adult recognition program. The conclusion reached validated the assumption that confusion exists concerning the various awards, and also that some recommended changes are appropriate for two of the existing awards.

## *Introduction*

### *Some Say Badges and Awards are for the Boys*

Yes, advancement and other programs are for the Scouts to receive recognition and some are just for the youth members. But think a minute, you as a leader are setting an example. That square knot on your uniform or that ribbon around your neck at meetings is letting the Scouts see that Scouting is a *Family* program. By your example you plant a seed for all Scouts to remember and hopefully to nourish in later years, when they too have boys in Scouting. In addition you are showing parents and other leaders you are TRAINED, you have TENURE, and your PERFORMANCE reflects your dedication to a Quality Scouting Program. So yes, awards are for the Scouts, and those awards that *you* wear are more for the Scouts than anyone else.



## *Discussion*

### **INTRODUCTION:**

The purpose of the guide is to provide an easy reference for Scouters: who wish to know more about the square knot awards program; who wish to have quick access to the various forms needed to keep track of their own service and training; and to give a basis for evaluation of others' service when making nominations for certain honor awards.

Every attempt has been made to provide the most current application form, but in the event that has not been done, I apologize. If there is any doubt, your Commissioner should be able to lend assistance.

### **REVIEW OF LITERATURE:**

The initial assumption was that this information exists elsewhere in Scouting literature. This does not seem to be the case. Even where it does exist, it is disjointed and in many cases is not accompanied by color art work.

Although now outdated, one of the best sources for information about this program appeared in the October 1989 issue of *Scouting* magazine. According to Ernest Doclar, in his interesting article "The BSA's Knot Awards", adult recognition began with our tradition of allowing leaders to wear their military decorations on the Scout uniform along with similarly displayed ribbons indicating their bulkier Scouting awards.

After World War II there were so many awards being worn that the national requirements and insignia committee decided to stop allowing the wear of BSA

awards on ribbon bars. It was in 1946, in *Scouting*, that the first six such square knots were announced: the Silver Buffalo, Silver Antelope, Silver Beaver, Scoutmaster's Key, Scouter's Training Award, and Skipper's Key.

Other sources used in gathering this data included, The Boy Scout Handbook, the Insignia Guide, the Advancement Guidelines, Leadership Training, and Baden-Powell the Two Lives of a Hero.

The Boy Scout Handbook is an excellent introduction to the requirements for youth achievement awards. These awards are earned only by youth and no other proof or justification is needed for an adult to wear them. Since this project is not about youth awards, no other references were used to investigate specific requirements.

There are detailed discussions on the wear of various parts of the uniform, to include adult recognition, contained in the Insignia Guide. However, this publication is in black and white and does not contain any display of square knots on a Scouter's uniform.

Advancement Guidelines, also contains some very pertinent discussion about the various awards within BSA, but has no illustrations. Some of the most valuable information in this pamphlet concerns what youth may wear versus what adults may wear.

Leadership Training, provides a host of information, to include many of the progress record sheets for leadership awards. Some printings of the pamphlet do not include Cub Scout Leader progress records, as these are now consolidated on the separate Cub Scout Leader Awards card. Another consideration when using this reference is that requirements for individual training awards may change before the updating of the pamphlet.

**William Harcourt in conspiracy with Lady Baden-Powell, has written an excellent biography of B-P. One of the closing chapters deals with B-P's recognition as the Chief Scout of the World. Harcourt talks here about the institution of the Silver Buffalo Award in the United States and the presentation of the first one to our founder.**

#### **METHODS:**

**As this was intended to be a project rather than a traditional academic thesis, the methods used were straight forward examination of various existing documents. The pertinent sections of each were excerpted and compiled here in a manner that is intended to be of easy use to the Scouting community.**

#### **RESULTS AND DISCUSSION:**

**The practice of wearing square knots is over 50 years old in BSA, and represents a wide range of achievement. There are now 31 knots. There is no precedence for wearing of these, other than the preference of the Scouter. They are worn in rows of three, sewn touching the top seam of the left uniform shirt pocket, touching one another, with odd knots worn centered and immediately above, on the next higher row.**

**Generally speaking, each knot represents the award of a medal, ribbon, or other device. Most are awarded only once, but the Scouter's Key, Scouter's Training Award, and Youth Religious Award may be earned in more than one program. They are therefore authorized to be worn with the program emblem on both the actual award and the square knot. Many Scouters wear Eagle palms on the square knot. There is a miniature Eagle pin that also may be worn on the square knot to indicate one is the recipient of the Distinguished Eagle Scout Award.**

Figure 1 shows a typical Scouter's uniform shirt, displaying youth achievement awards and various leadership awards. One can tell in which program the Key and Training Award have been earned by the various devices being worn.

#### **SUMMARY:**

It was determined that there was no single document in Scouting's library that fully addressed the Square Knot Awards program. Additionally, after compiling and reviewing the current application forms, there seems to be some inconsistencies. These are particularly present in the earning of the Key and Training awards by the Commissioner service.

This document places a single source of requirements, with the appropriate application forms for each of the 31 current square knots, in the hands of Scouters. It also provides some background and illustrations that should be helpful when recommending others, as well as when preparing one's own uniform for proper wear.

Finally it makes recommendation to the National Council for some minor changes.

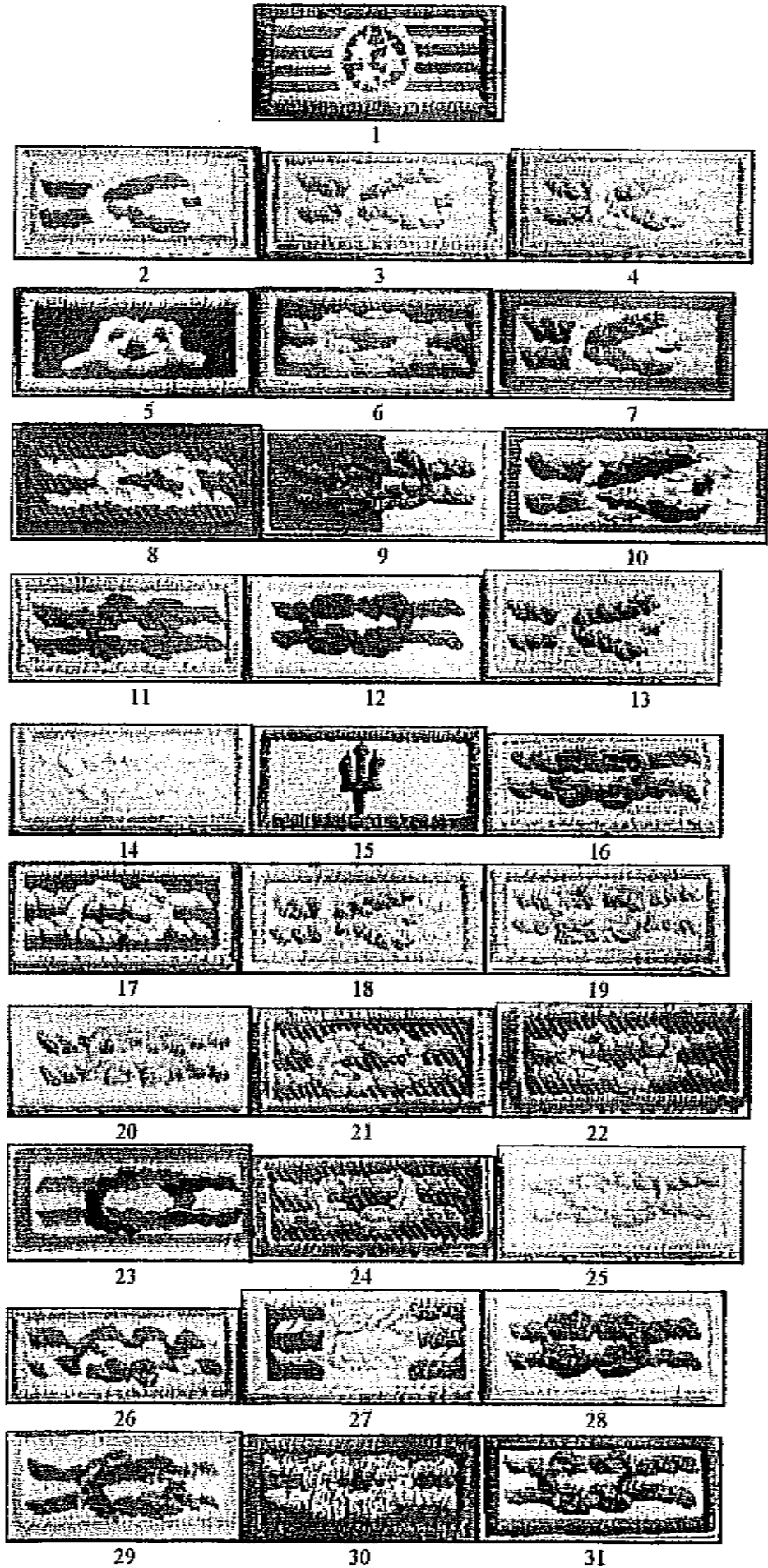

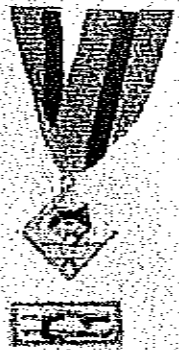
**Den Leader Coach Award.** For den leader coaches who have completed training and performance and served for 2 years. Medallion, No. 00953; knot, No. 05023.

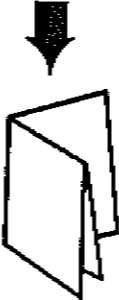

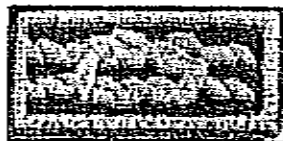

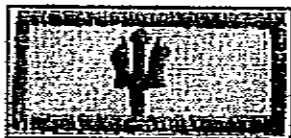

## NATIONAL PRESIDENT'S SCOUTMASTER AWARD OF MERIT

### Background

Shortly after the National Eagle Scout Association was established in 1972, it began to make available a NESA Scoutmaster Award. Since then, the award was presented on a basis of one per BSA area each year to a Scoutmaster who had a record of the proper use of the Boy Scout advancement and a significant number of his Boy Scouts attaining the Eagle Scout rank. This award will be discontinued on December 31, 1987.

The President of the Boy Scouts of America has requested that NESA convert its award into a Scoutmaster Award of Merit which could be earned by all Scoutmasters. His rationale is that there is a need for recognizing a man relatively early in his work as a Scoutmaster prior to his qualifying for the Scouter's Key.

### Requirements

The nominee need not be an Eagle Scout but must:

1. Be a currently registered Scoutmaster who has served in that position for at least 18 months
2. Have achieved the Quality Unit Award at least once during his period of service
3. Have completed Boy Scout Leader Fast Start and Scoutmastership Fundamentals or equivalent
4. Have a record of proper use of the Boy Scout advancement program resulting in a majority of his Boy Scouts attaining the First Class rank
5. Have a record of:
  - Development of boy leadership through the patrol method
  - Positive relations with the troop's chartered organization
  - An extensive outdoor program including strong summer camp attendance
  - A positive image of Scouting in the community
  - A troop operation which attracts and retains Boy Scouts

### Procedure

The chairman of the troop committee has the responsibility of nominating the Scoutmaster on behalf of the patrol leaders' council and the troop committee.

The nomination is certified by the unit commissioner and forwarded to the local council service center.

Approval authority lies with the Scout executive and either the council NESA chairman or the council commissioner.

The Scout executive will forward a listing of the names of Scoutmasters who are to receive the award to the director of the National Eagle Scout Association at the national office. The notation should be made on council stationery and certified by the Scout executive and either the council NESA chairman or the council commissioner. Rather than submitting only one name on the letter, Scout executives are encouraged to submit several names together.

### Award

A full-color certificate will be provided by NESA free of charge. A cost of \$1.50 per certificate will be charged for a certificate which has the recipient's name hand lettered. Payment should accompany the order.

The National Eagle Scout Association will send the certificates to the Scout executive via pouch mail. A 3-week turnaround should be allowed if the names of recipients are to be hand lettered on the certificates. Those unlettered require a 2-week turnaround time.

A full-color, 6-inch, jacket patch, No. 5004, is available through the Supply Division.

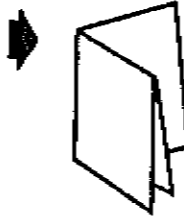
There is a square knot (white or tan) for the uniform.

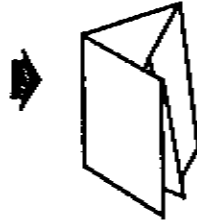

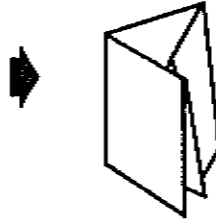

## *Seabadge Trident Award*

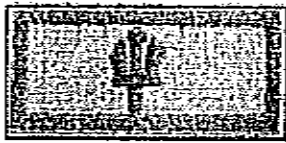

The Seabadge Trident has no Progress Record. It is a cross between the Green Woodbadge neckerchief and the Woodbadge beads. Seabadge, like Woodbadge, is the capstone training for adult leaders in the Sea Explorer program. The Trident is awarded at the completion of the course work. The leader then goes on to work the "Rutter" (ticket in Woodbadge), and upon completion is awarded a small Trident pin which is worn along with the Trident knot. It is similar to Woodbadge beads, in that there are two variations to the single Trident. A staff member of a Seabadge course is authorized to wear a double Trident Knot, and the course Skipper wears a triple Trident knot.

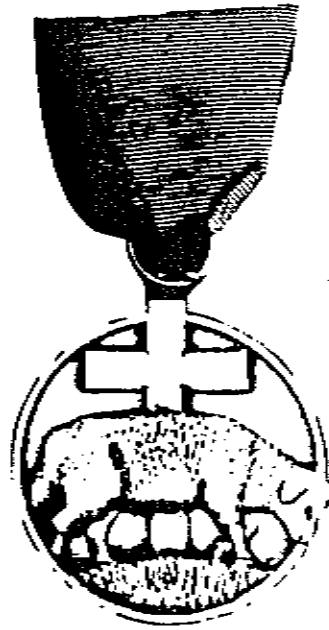

# The Lamb Award

## THE AWARD

The Lamb Award is a national recognition bestowed on Lutheran adults (including laypersons, pastors, professional church workers, men and women) by the Lutheran Committee on Civic Youth Agency Relationships [LCCYAR]. (This committee is formed by and responsible to the youth ministry departments of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America [ELCA] and The Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod [LCMS].)

The purpose of The Lamb Award is twofold: 1) to acknowledge the distinguished service of Lutheran adults in fostering the spiritual growth of youth through church and civic youth serving agency programs (Boy Scouts of America, Girl Scouts of the U.S.A., Camp Fire Boys and Girls, 4-H and others); 2) to increase use and quality of the civic agency programs in Lutheran congregations as a part of their ministries with youth.

## ELIGIBILITY

Any adult who is an active member of a Lutheran congregation who has given a minimum of 10 years distinguished volunteer service as a Christian role model and leader to young people, in any capacity, through the church and one or more civic youth agencies is eligible for nomination. Self and spouse nominations will not be accepted (the award seeks the individual; the individual does not seek the award).

3. **Civic Youth Agency Leadership**: Provide a detailed history of the nominee's leadership positions in the agency. Include a list of all adult leadership training courses attended both as a learner and as an instructor. Also provide a list of the awards received as an adult for service in the agency. Please include dates served.
4. **Recruitment**: List efforts to organize new units in the nominee's own and neighboring Lutheran congregations; give a description of the nominee's efforts to recruit youth for his/her own or neighboring unit and promote full involvement of members in the program; list Lutherans recruited as adult volunteers in the agency with which the candidate is associated, including those giving service to units not in Lutheran congregations, above the unit level and as agency professionals.
5. **Group Service Projects**: Cite examples of service projects involving the pack, troop, club, etc. (not individual service projects). Examples: walkathon, bikeathon, CROP walk, or other activity for the benefit of a deserving cause; collection and distribution of clothing, food or other household items to persons in need; developing a service project for the congregation in response to a community or congregational need.

### III. REQUIRED LETTERS OF RECOMMENDATION

Letters are to be written on appropriate letterhead.

Letter 1: From the pastor(\*) of the congregation of which the nominee is a member. It should contain information, including dates, about the nominee's participation in the worship life and programs of the congregation. A minimum of 10 years of volunteer service is required. If the nominee is clergy, the letter of recommendation needs to come from the circuit counselor (LCMS) or conference/cluster dean (ELCA).

(\*) In the event of a pastoral vacancy, the letter of recommendation is to be submitted by the president/chairperson of the congregation.

Letter 2: From the executive of the local Boy Scout, Girl Scout or Camp Fire council, the county extension agent of 4-H; or the professional superior of the nominee in other agencies. It should identify service as an adult volunteer, particularly service above the unit level, training taken and adult awards received.

Letter 3: From the president/chairperson or other officer of the nominee's congregation. It should give information about positions held in the congregation and special service rendered, e.g., teacher, usher, convention delegate, officer, committee member, etc.

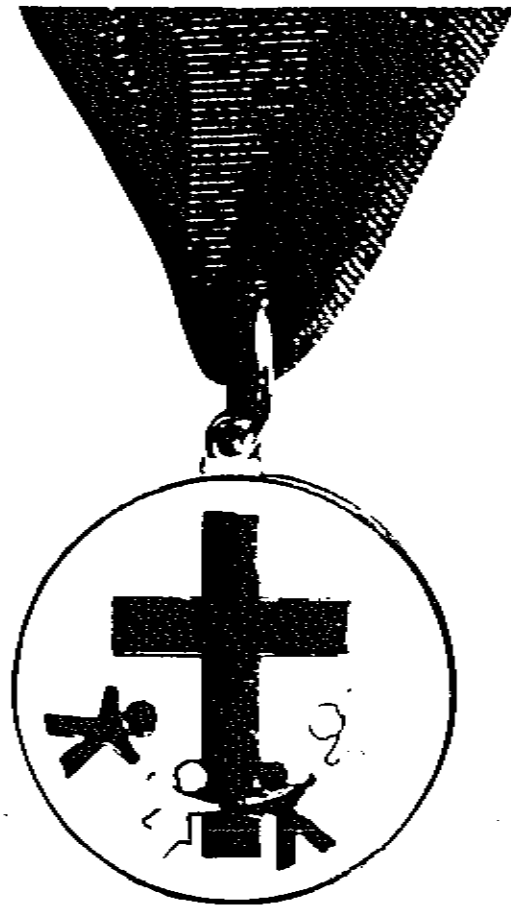

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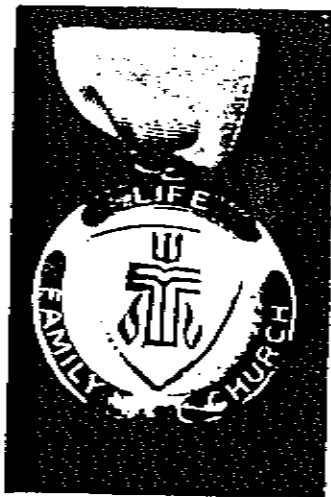

## THE AWARD

The God and Service Award is a national recognition awarded by Churches and Agencies cooperating in the Commission for Church and Youth Agency Relationships. It is given for distinguished service by adults in ministry to young people through service to the Church and one or more of the national youth agencies (Boy Scouts of America, Girl Scouts of the U.S.A., and Camp Fire, Inc.).

## ELIGIBILITY

The God and Service Award may be given to any adult who is an active member of his or her church and who has rendered a minimum of five years of distinguished service to young people through the Church and a minimum of five years of distinguished service to young people through a national youth agency.

Self and spouse nominations will not be accepted: The award seeks the individual; the individual does not seek the award. If possible, the nominee should be kept unaware that he or she is being recommended for the God and Service Award.



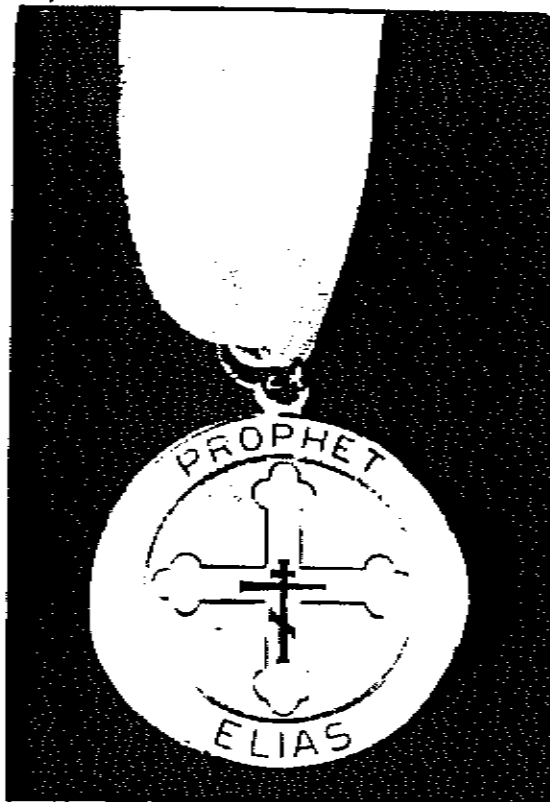

## LETTERS OF RECOMMENDATION

1. The first letter is required from the pastor (or an officer) of the nominee's congregation. The letter must be written on church letterhead. It should contain information about the nominee's participation in the worship life and programs of the congregation. The letter may be from the regional or national church body.
2. The second letter is required from the executive of the local youth agency council (Boy Scouts of America, Girl Scouts of the U.S.A., or Camp Fire, Inc.) or the professional superior of the nominee in other agencies. The letter must be written on council letterhead. It should contain information about the nominee's service as an adult volunteer, the training completed, and adult awards received.

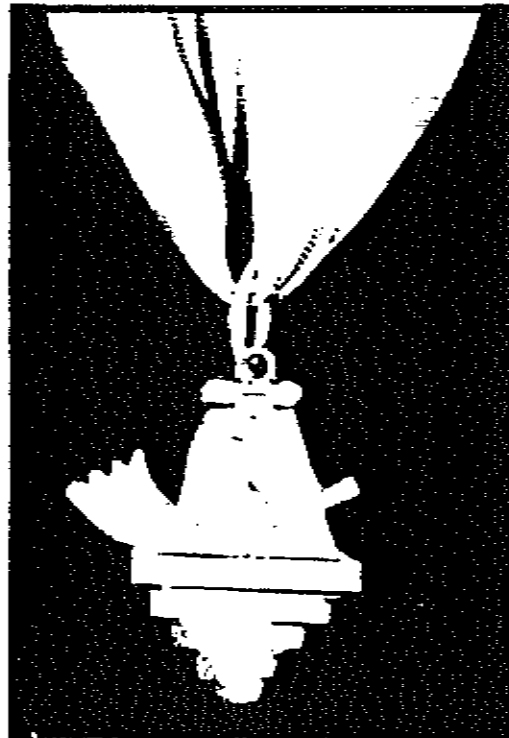
2. The emblem should be presented in an Orthodox Christian Church, preferably by the Bishop, a Diocesan or Deanery Official, or by the pastor of the sponsoring Church.
3. Since the Prophet Elias Emblem is a church award sanctioned by the national youth agencies, and not an award of those organizations, it is appropriately presented at a church ceremony, and an agency ceremony. It may be presented at an Ecumenical Boy Scout, Girl Scout, or Camp Fire religious observance, or, in the case of a non-Orthodox recipient, at a religious observance of the recipient's faith.

Publicity is appropriate, in Diocesan publications, fraternal newspapers, or local, regional, or national publications.

The Executive Committee of the Eastern Orthodox Committee on Scouting has amended the Prophet Elias Award application: all applications submitted from December 15, 1994 must be accompanied by letters of recommendations from [1] the parish priest, and [2] a Boy Scout, Girl Scout or Camp Fire professional. These letters must be submitted on letterhead.

# The Shofar Award

of the  
National Jewish Committee on Scouting



## The Award

The National Jewish Committee on Scouting established the Shofar Award to recognize outstanding service by adults in the promotion of Scouting among Jewish youth. Just as the Shofar (Ram's Horn) calls people to the service of God, so the Shofar Award is a recognition of the individual who has answered the call to serve Jewish youth in Scouting. Self and spouse nominations will not be accepted.

## Eligibility Guidelines

A Shofar recipient should:

1. Promote the use of Scouting in synagogues, Jewish Community Centers, and other Jewish institutions.
2. Encourage Jewish youth to join the Boy Scouts of America as Tiger Cubs, Cub Scouts, Boy Scouts, Varsity Scouts, and Explorers.
3. Recruit Jewish leaders on unit, district, and council levels.
4. Encourage and assist Scouts in earning the Maccabee, Aleph, and Ner Tamid emblems.
5. Promote religious observance on camping trips and at camporees, summer camp, Scout Sabbath, and other functions.
6. Exemplify religious convictions by personal participation in the ideals of Jewish Life.

# FRIENDS

## Emblem for Adults working with the Boy Scouting or Girl Scouting/Guiding Programs



### Purpose

The FRIENDS emblem is an adult recognition program sponsored by the Friends Committee on Scouting, a program of the Friends World Committee for Consultation, Section of the Americas. The purpose of this program is to recognize outstanding contributions to the spiritual and social development of Young Friends through Quaker programs, and through the Boy Scouting, Girl Scouting, or Girl Guiding programs.

### Emblem

The FRIENDS emblem incorporates an eight-pointed star, known as the *Quaker Star*, with a scriptural quotation central to Quaker beliefs, *A light that shines in the dark*. The red and black Quaker star dates back to work performed by English Friends during the Franco-Prussian War of 1872. It has long been associated with Quaker relief service worldwide. The scriptural passage comes from the first chapter of the Gospel of John, fifth verse. It refers to the light of God which shines in all humanity.

# NOMINATION PROCESS

## I. Letter of Nomination

In a letter of nomination, describe concisely the candidate's service to the spiritual and social development of Young Friends through Quaker programs and through the Boy Scouting, Girl Scouting, and/or Girl Guiding programs. A summary of not more than one hundred words in length should be attached on a separate sheet.

## II. Resume of Candidate's Activities

Submit a separate resume of the nominee's Meeting/Church and Girl Scout/Guide and/or Boy Scout involvement using an outline form. The following elements should be included:

1. Monthly Meeting/Church
  - a) Name and address of Meeting or Church
  - b) Name and address of Clerk/Pastor or local Meeting leaders
  - c) Service rendered and tenure in leadership positions
2. Boy Scouting, Girl Scouting, and/or Girl Guiding Organization
  - a) Name and address of group(s)
  - b) Name and address of supervisor in the organizations(s)
  - c) Past and present leadership positions
  - d) Leadership training courses attended as learner and as instructor
  - e) Youth and adult awards received for service in the organization
- 3) Other Service Experience
  - a) Name and address of organization
  - b) Name and address of supervisor
  - c) Description of nature of service rendered
- 4) References
  - a) List two additional references from Month Meeting/Church who may be contacted to verify information sent.
  - b) List two additional references from Boy Scout and/or Girl Scout/Guide organization(s) who may be contacted to verify information sent.

## III. Letters of Recommendation: Submit letters of recommendation from the following:

1. Clerk/Pastor or other representative of either Monthly, Quarterly, Yearly Meeting, or national Quaker body of which candidate is a member or attender. List information on candidate's participation in worship life, programs and other service rendered.
2. Knowledgeable and influential adult at the local, regional, or national level of the Girl Scouts of the U.S.A., Boy Scouts of America, Scouts Canada, Girl Guides of Canada, or any other Boy Scouting or Girl Scouting/Guiding organization in the Americas. Cite service of the candidate as an adult volunteer, training taken, and adult awards received.



## **The Saint George Award of the Episcopal Church**

### **THE AWARD**

The St. George Award of the Episcopal Church is a national recognition to acknowledge distinguished service by adults in the spiritual, physical, mental and moral development of youth through service to the Church and through national youth agency programs.

The St. George Award may be presented to any adult (including laypersons, ordained persons, professional church workers, men and women) who are active in their church and one or more of the national youth agencies (Boy Scouts of America, Girl Scouts of the U.S.A., Camp Fire, Inc., 4-H, Brotherhood of St. Andrew, and Daughters of the King). The award is made available through the Youth Ministries Office of the Episcopal Church Center.

### **ELIGIBILITY**

The award may be given to any adult who has made an exemplary contribution to the national youth agency ministry in the Episcopal Church. The award may not be given posthumously. Self-nominations and spouse nominations will not be accepted. The award seeks the individual, the individual does not seek the award. If possible, the candidate should be kept unaware of the fact that he/she is being recommended for the St. George Award.

## **"SUGGESTED GUIDELINES AND CRITERIA FOR NOMINATION"**

Candidates nominated for the St. George Award should:

### **A. National Youth Agency**

1. Encourage youth to join a national youth agency program.
2. Promote the organization of agency units in Episcopal churches.
3. Recruit volunteers to give leadership at any level.
4. Be fully trained in their area of responsibility and be outstanding in their sense of responsibility, humility, and good example.
5. Create a better understanding for clergy and laity of the aims and ideals of national youth agencies through the church press and other communication media.
6. Exhibit past and present leadership in a national youth agency program.

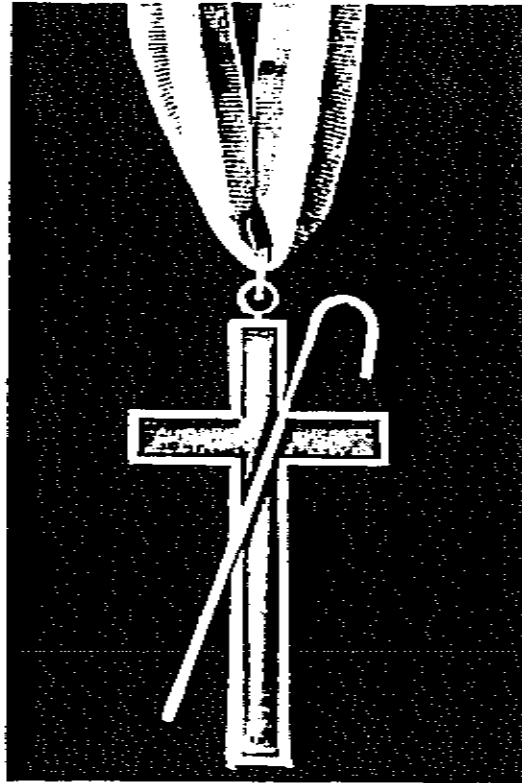
### **B. Religious Emblems Program for Youth**

1. Assist and encourage youth to serve their Lord through the God and Country Program for Episcopal youth, and serve as counselor.
2. Encourage youth to participate in the religious emblems program of their faith.
3. Promote religious observances at national youth agency functions at all levels.
4. Uphold and interpret the Episcopal position in matters affecting the Church's ministry to youth as related to appropriate council and/or chapter functions and activities.
5. Encourage youth to do service projects for the chartering/sponsoring partner or community.

### **C. Church and Community**

1. Exemplify their religious convictions by ongoing personal participation in the religious, cultural, or philanthropic life of their community.
2. Give adequate help to their home as well as the homes of others.
3. Give evidence that they lead their family into a strong relationship with God.
4. Give outstanding service to the local parish.
5. Be highly regarded by others in the Church for their Christian example.





## **The Good Shepherd Baptist Adult Recognition**

### **THE EMBLEM**

The Good Shepherd Emblem is a national recognition for adults who have rendered outstanding service to Baptist youth through their church and one of the national youth-serving agencies (Boy Scouts of America, Girl Scouts of the U.S.A., or Camp Fire, Inc.). The emblem is made available through the Association of Baptists for Scouting in cooperation with the national youth serving agencies. Its purpose is to acknowledge distinguished service by laypersons and pastors leading toward the spiritual, physical, mental, and moral development of Baptist youth through service to the church and its youth programs.

### **ELIGIBILITY**

The emblem may be given to any adult (18 years or older) who has made an exemplary contribution to his or her church and one of the youth-serving agencies. The nominee must have demonstrated leadership as a "Good Shepherd" in his or her service to youth. It is preferable that this leadership extend over a period of not less than 10 years. Recipients must have a minimum of five years of active service in one or more of the national youth-serving agencies, and a like tenure of active service in local church ministry. The emblem may not be given posthumously. Self and spouse nominations will not be accepted. The emblem seeks the individual; the individual does not seek the emblem. If possible, the nominee should be kept unaware of the fact that he/she is being recommended for the Good Shepherd Emblem.

## INSTRUCTIONS

The St. George emblem is a national recognition approved by the National Catholic Committee on Scouting. It may be presented to any adult who is working in the Scouting program. It may be given to clerics, laity, or Scouters of other faiths.

The purpose of this program is to recognize the recipient's outstanding contribution to the spiritual development of Catholic youth in the program of the Boy Scouts of America.

There shall be permitted annually one emblem for each archdiocese/diocese plus one for every 20 Catholic units or fractions thereof with emphasis on the importance of being selective, and that there be no feeling

that the full quota *must* be used every year. *No honorary recognitions are to be made.*

The recipients of the emblem are to be *sought after* and selected by an active committee of at least five members. This committee is to be newly appointed annually by the archdiocesan/diocesan Scout chaplain at least 90 days before date set for emblem presentation.

Recommendations should carefully detail how the nominee meets the guidelines for selection. Other awards are presented for general Scouting achievements by districts, local councils, regions, and the national office. The St. George recommendations are evaluated on the basis of the guidelines described.

## GUIDE FOR SELECTION COMMITTEE

Following are some guidelines for selecting St. George emblem candidates. These suggestions are offered as a guide only; however, they are indicative of some of the things that the selection committee should be looking for. This list is not inclusive as there are many other areas that could be considered.

- A. Promote the religious emblems program for Catholic boys and serve as a counselor. Encourage non-Catholic boys to participate in the religious emblems program of their faith.
- B. Notable service in promoting Catholic activities and service projects for the church and willingness to serve on like committees.
- C. Active participation in the Scouter development program, Scout retreats or days of recollection—instrumental in having others participate.
- D. Outstanding service in promoting and participating in Scout Sunday observance.
- E. Notable service in bringing Scouting to more boys under Catholic auspices.
- F. Assist parishes and Catholic organizations in recruiting Scoutmasters and other key leaders.
- G. One who is fully trained in the skills of Scouting and outstanding for his or her sense of responsibility, humility, and good example.
- H. Responsible for Catholic boys being transported to mass at camporees and summer camps and providing for spiritual needs of the non-Catholics within these groups.
- I. Encourage the true spirit of ecumenism as well as parochial responsibility and Catholic leadership within various Scouting units under Catholic auspices.
- J. Instrumental in organizing and assisting diocesan Together-We-Organize programs and promoting the full Scouting program in all parishes including multiple units where needed.
- K. Making a significant contribution to Scouting in the field of Catholic relationships.
- L. Through the Catholic press and other communication media, create a better understanding of the aims and ideals of Scouting by clergy and laity.
- M. Give leadership in promoting Scouting for all boys regardless of race or creed and instrumental in organizing Scouting units in the inner-city.

NOTE: Work accomplishment and dedication rather than a specific number of years in Scouting should be the criteria for receiving this emblem.

## AWARDING THE RECOGNITION

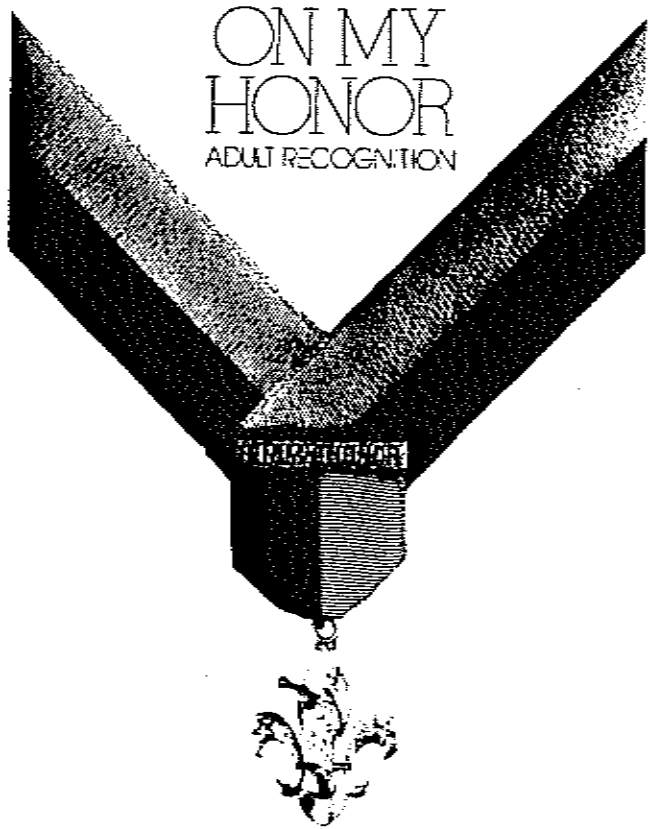
As in the case of the On My Honor award, the bishop or branch president controls the recognition. He may order recognition ribbons directly from the local Church distribution center. When the applicant has completed the requirements and the bishop or branch president has signed this card, the recognition may be made by the bishop or branch president at a Court of Honor.

## WEARING THE RECOGNITION

The recognition ribbon should be worn as part of the Scout uniform in ceremonial settings. The purple Religious Square Knot Patch may also be worn on the uniform.

4. Be thoroughly familiar with the Atonic Priesthood or Primary program as shown in an interview with the bishop.
5. Be worthy as shown in an interview with the bishop.
6. Complete the basic training for Scouting leaders.

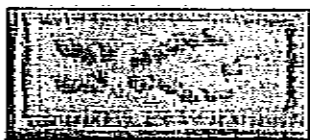

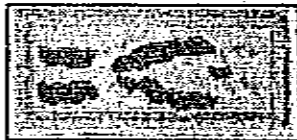

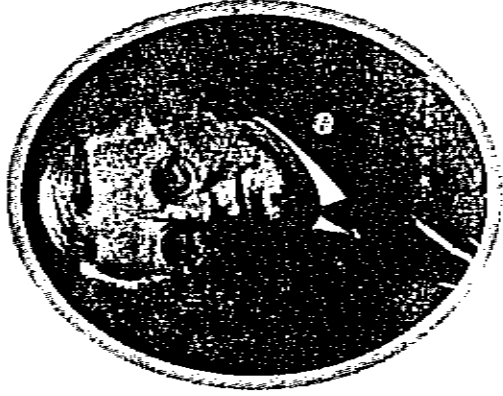

**Red Arrow Award.** The award was created in 1967 to recognize individuals who are not members of the Order of the Arrow, for outstanding service to the Order. This attractive award, a red arrow and medallion superimposed on an engraved plaque, and a miniature charm for civilian wear, can be awarded only by action of the national Order of the Arrow Committee. Recommendations, by personal letter, should be sent to the national director. The awards are presented at the national Order of the Arrow conference.

**Distinguished Service Award.** The Distinguished Service Award was created in 1940 to honor those who rendered service to the Order beyond the lodge level. The award is presented to those Arrowmen who have rendered distinguished and outstanding service to the Order on a sectional, regional, or national basis. It is given primarily for dedicated service to the Order and Scouting over a period of years. The first were presented at Camp Twin Echo, Pennsylvania, to E. Urner Goodman, Carroll A. Edson, and eight others at the 1940 national meeting. Between 1940 and the first national conference in 1948, the award was presented at national meetings as deserving individuals were found. Thereafter, the award presentation became a traditional part of the pageantry and ceremony of the national conference. Since the time of the first awards in 1940, approximately 500 Distinguished Service Awards have been presented. This alone is a testament to its high standard of excellence. The award is a sterling silver arrowhead, bearing an arrow pointing upward and to the wearer's right, suspended from a white neck-ribbon upon which are embroidered red arrows. A white square knot embroidered upon red cloth is also available for uniform wear. A miniature silver arrowhead lapel pin is also available for civilian wear. Presentation of the award is limited. Arrowmen whose service records are the most outstanding and extend farthest beyond others in the local lodge are usually selected. Nominations are open to both youth and adult Arrowmen. Nominations must be made on form No. 24-201.



# NATIONAL ORDER OF THE ARROW COMMITTEE

## DISTINGUISHED SERVICE AWARD



The National Order of the Arrow committee presents the Distinguished Service Award to those Arrowmen who have rendered outstanding service to the Order on a sectional, area, regional, or national basis. It is given primarily for dedicated service to the Order and Scouting over a period of years. Only a limited number of awards can be presented. Arrowmen whose service records are the most outstanding and extend the farthest beyond the local lodge level are usually selected. Young men under 21 and adults are eligible for nomination. Nominations will not be accepted or considered for posthumous awards.

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## INSTRUCTIONS

The George Meany Award is a national recognition approved by the AFL-CIO Executive Council. It may be presented to any adult male or female union member who has made a significant contribution to Scouting.

There shall be permitted, annually, one award for each City Central Labor Body plus one for each State Central

Labor Body with emphasis on the importance of being selective. There is no rule that the full quota must be used every year. No honorary recognitions should be made.

The purpose of this award is to recognize the recipient's outstanding service to youth through the programs of the Boy Scouts of America.

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## GUIDE FOR SELECTION COMMITTEE

Following are some qualifications, a combination of which might make the requirements for this recognition. These are offered as a guide only. However, they are indicative of what the Selection Committee should be looking for. This list is not inclusive as there are many other areas that could be considered.

- A. Has notably served in bringing Scouting to more boys.
- B. Has assisted organizations in recruiting Scoutmasters and other key leaders.

- C. Is fully trained in the skills of Scouting and outstanding for his or her sense of responsibility and humility and good example.
- D. Has made a significant contribution to Scouting in the field of labor relationships.
- E. Has led in promoting Scouting for all boys regardless of race or creed and has been instrumental in organizing Scouting units in the inner city and ghettos.

**NOTE:** Work accomplishment and dedication rather than a specific number of years in Scouting should be the criteria for receiving this award.

# THE WHITNEY M. YOUNG, JR., SERVICE AWARD

## PURPOSE

The purpose of the Whitney M. Young, Jr., Service Award is to recognize outstanding services by an adult individual or an organization for demonstrated involvement in the development and implementation of Scouting opportunities for low-income, inner-city, and rural youth—this is in fulfillment of Mr. Young's "dream of justice and equality for all."

## METHOD

Nominations may be submitted by any registered adult member of the Boy Scouts of America to a BSA local council. The nominees for the award should be carefully screened by a committee appointed by the president of the local council; the committee should include a member of the council's urban/rural planning committee, if there is one, and the council's relationships committee.

The council's annual quota of awards shall not exceed the number of districts in the council. Emphasis is on being selective and with no intention that the full quota must be used every year. The quota is noncumulative.

Nominations will be submitted by the local council to the national Urban and Rural Field Service Committees for review and consideration of approval *before* the award is announced or presented. Allow *2 months* for national approval process.

It is highly recommended that an appropriate ceremony be conducted with a council executive board member presiding and making the presentation at either a district annual business meeting, district appreciation dinner, council annual business meeting, council dinner, or a major function that the recipient is associated with.

# SERVICE RECORD OF NOMINEE

## GUIDELINES FOR THE NOMINATING COMMITTEE

The following are examples of the criteria, a combination of which might make a possible candidate for this recognition. They suggest what the nominating committee should be looking for. This list is not inclusive, as there are many other areas that could be considered.

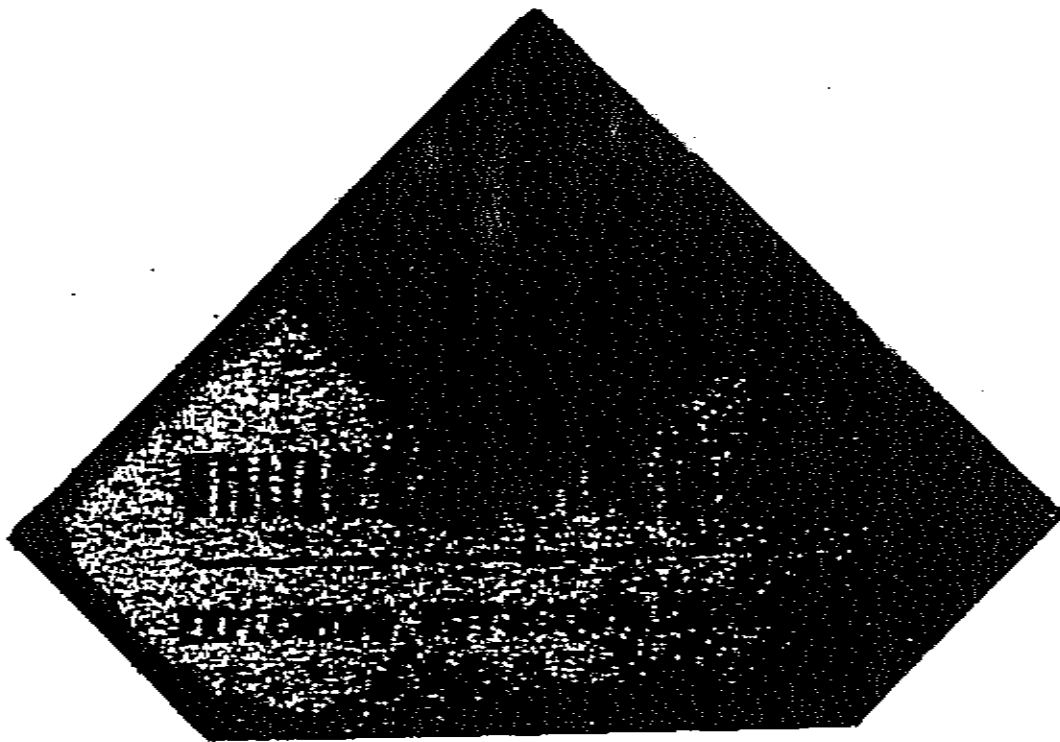

## WILLIAM H. SPURGEON III AWARD

**Recognition for individuals and organizations making an outstanding contribution to the Exploring program of the Boy Scouts of America**

The William H. Spurgeon III Award was developed by the national Exploring Committee in 1971 in honor of the man who is regarded as one of the major leaders in the development of special-interest Exploring. Mr. Spurgeon was a business executive in Southern California who personally organized many special-interest Explorer posts. His pioneering efforts lead to the present contemporary Exploring program. He devoted much of his later years to promoting Exploring and is particularly remembered as a dynamic speaker for council Exploring Impact Plan luncheons across America. Mr. Spurgeon served for many years as a member of the BSA's National Executive Board and national Exploring Committee.

The award is designed for council use to recognize individuals or organizations providing outstanding leadership to Exploring within the council. The award is also presented on a regional and national basis.

**Awards to Individuals.** The council may present the Spurgeon Award to men and women who have rendered outstanding service to youth as an Explorer post adult leader or as a district, division, or council Exploring volunteer.

The award is unique to Exploring and is not meant to replace the Silver Beaver Award, District Award of Merit, or other council recognition for volunteers. Each council may determine the criteria and procedure for granting the award.



However, it is recommended that priority be given to Explorer post Advisors.

**Awards to Organizations.** The council may present the Spurgeon Award to churches, schools, industries, labor unions, governmental agencies, civic clubs, fraternal groups, and other community organizations that have an outstanding record of providing leadership to Exploring. Each council may determine the criteria and procedure for granting the award. However, it is recommended that priority be given to organizations that operate one or more Explorer posts.

**Recognition Items.** The following items are available to councils from the BSA Supply Division:

**Spurgeon Award, No. 17533,** suitable for local engraving for presentation to individuals and organizations.

**Spurgeon Award lapel pin, No. 04004,** for civilian wear by individuals.

**Spurgeon Award square knot, No. 05021,** for wear on BSA uniforms by individuals.

(The same awards are presented on a regional and national basis.)

**Selection Procedure.** A selections committee is appointed by the council Exploring chairman in consultation with the council Exploring director or Scout executive. It is recommended that this committee consist of persons familiar with Exploring in the council. The committee should develop criteria for the award and begin a search for potential recipients. Volunteers and staff members related to districts, clusters, or Exploring service areas should be encouraged to nominate prospects. Do not inform individuals or organizations of their nominations. The selections committee evaluates these prospects and determines which are to receive the award. While there is no set number of Spurgeon Awards a council may present, it is recommended that a minimum number be presented each year to preserve the status of the award. Those receiving the award are then notified and a ceremony is planned for a suitable public recognition. This could be a council annual meeting, Explorer banquet, program conference, or other occasion. Awards to organizations might be given at their annual meeting or other gathering to generate maximum public awareness. The award should be presented to the top person in the organization. The council should generate publicity, photographs, and media involvement where possible.

**Suggested Criteria.** Each council determines the criteria for presenting the Spurgeon Award. The following suggestions might be considered for individuals:

1. The person should receive the award for service rendered as an adult leader. The Spurgeon Award may not be given to Explorers or for service rendered while an Explorer. (The Exploring Leadership Award, No. 23-203, is designed for this purpose.)
2. The person should have rendered outstanding service over a considerable period of time to Exploring, either as an adult Explorer post leader or as a member of the council/division/district Exploring committee. Consideration could be given to community or corporate leaders who have given exceptional leadership to Exploring and the youth of their community. The Spurgeon Award is not designed to recognize financial contributions alone.

**For organizations:**

The organization should be recognized for providing exceptional leadership and support for Exploring over an extended period of time. Consideration should be given to organizations that have operated one or more outstanding Explorer posts/ships and/or organizations that have supported Exploring in the council, such as schools and corporations supporting the career interest survey, etc. The Spurgeon Award is not designed to recognize financial contributors alone.

**Regional Spurgeon Awards.** Each BSA region may present the Spurgeon Award to individuals and/or organizations that have rendered exceptional service to Exploring in the region.

**National Spurgeon Awards.** Since 1971, the national Exploring Committee has presented the Spurgeon Award to more than eighty national organizations and individuals who have rendered significant service to Exploring nationwide. The award to organizations is generally given for operating a large number of Explorer posts/ships and/or providing activities, scholarships, or programs for Explorers. A list of recipients is available from the national Exploring Division upon request.

**Conclusion.** This publication contains all information related to the Spurgeon Award. Sample nomination forms, etc., are not available, as each council develops its own. The recognition items are available only to councils from the BSA Supply Division.

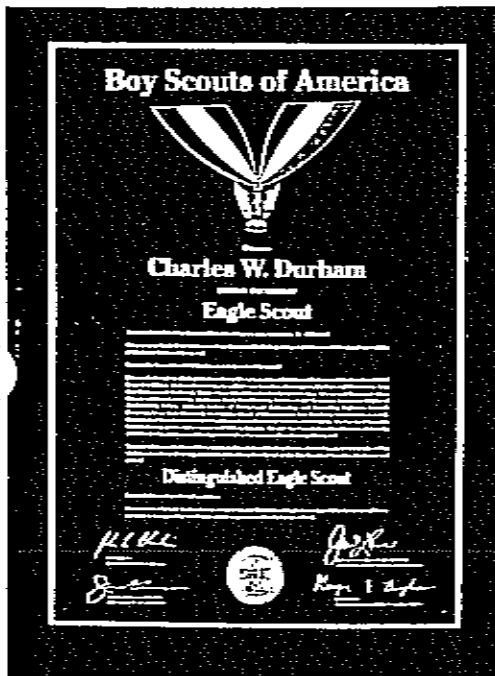
