## *HISTORY OF SCOUTING IN MACON COUNTY*

### *THE BEGINNING*

In 1915, just five years after scouting was introduced into the United States on February 8, 1910, scouting was brought to Macon County. The first troops lacked the organization found today. It is doubtful whether the troops had numbers or advancement in rank. What they lacked in organization they more than made up in enthusiasm.

Charter members of the first troop would include names familiar to long time residents of the county. Some of these men are T. W. Angel, Edgar Angel, Lee Barnard, R. S. Jones, Allen Siler, Jeronimo Ray, Gilmer Crawford, Dean Simpson, Ballard Bryson, Quince Hauser, Tracy Barnard and Steve Porter.

Scouting activities declined during World War One, during the influenza epidemic and years later due to the effects of the Great Depression.

On January 12, 1933 scouting had a new beginning. Ten men from Macon County attended Scout Leader training. The first troop of the new era was organized in March 1933 and the first scouts to attain the rank of Eagle received their promotions in 1936. Scouts in Macon and surrounding counties were involved in countless civic activities.

Involvement in scouting slowed prior to and during World War Two. Activity was to suffer again in the years after the war due to the outbreak of polio in the area.

Charles Weimar Slagle, a veteran of World War Two, member of the Rotary Club, Commander of the American Legion Post, scoutmaster and one of the first Eagle

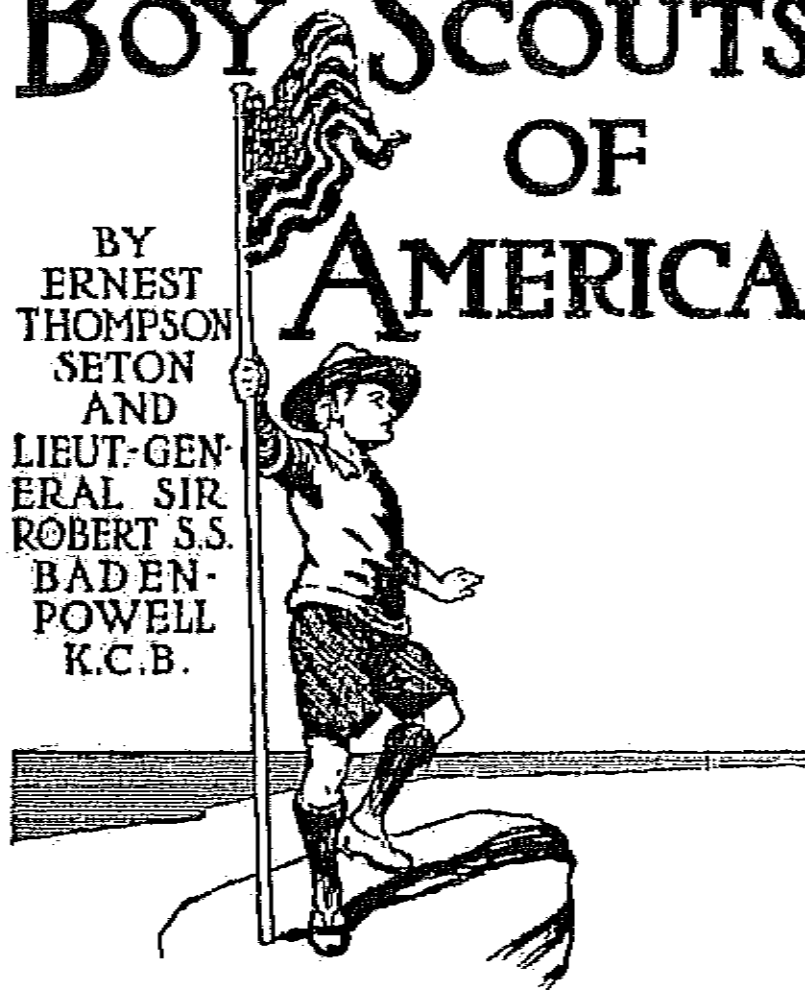
Scouts in Macon County, died an accidental death six months after returning home from the war. The Slagle Memorial Building and Veteran's Memorial Park were built to honor him as well as all other veterans killed in war. The building was also to serve as a meeting place for Macon's first troop of boy scouts, Troop 1. This troop remains active to this day, and has been renumbered Troop 202.

The following pages contain a collection of news articles taken from the Franklin Press and the Highlands Maconian from February 1926 to September 1960. Hopefully they will be interesting, informative and will serve to provide answers to many of the mysteries surrounding scouting in this county.

*BOY SCOUT NEWS*

If you have been reading the daily papers this week you have probably noticed a great deal about the activities of the Boy Scouts of America. This week is known as "Scout Week" and there are special programs in most of the cities and towns of America to honor the sixteenth anniversary of the inauguration of this great movement.

It is well for us to remember just how large and important this organization known as the Boy Scouts of America is and how long it has been functioning.

The Boy Scouts of America was inaugurated as an organization February 8, 1910, and was chartered by Congress, June 1916. This organization extends from coast to coast and is functioning in more than fifty other nations of the world. There are enrolled at the present time in this country more than 800,000 boys and there are thousands of men now living who owe their success to the training they received while boy scouts.

Now here is something mighty important for us to remember in connection with this great organization. Of the more than 2,000,000 men and boys who are and have been scouts, none have ever been before the courts of justice for any serious delinquencies if conduct. Out of 32 American college men winning Rhodes Scholarships of 1925, 14 have been scouts and several of them are still scouts in the capacity of leaders and teachers. When you think of the type of men selected for the Rhodes Scholarships you can see what value is placed upon the work of this great organization.

*JANUARY 19, 1933*

*SCOUTLEADERS SCHOOL OPENS*

*10 FRANKLIN MEN TAKING TRAINING COURSE AT SYLVA.*

Thirty-three men, including 10 from Franklin, attended the first session of the Scout Leaders' School Thursday night at the high school building in Sylva. The men were welcomed by Prof. W. C. Reed, chairman of the Smoky Mountains district of the Boy Scouts and J. H. Kirk, chairman of the training committee for the district. Three other sessions are to be held, Mr. Kirk announced. The second and third are to be held at Sylva on Thursday night January 19 and 26 and the final session will be held at the Cherokee school on Friday afternoon and Saturday, February 3 and 4.

The course is open to anyone interested in boys and is part of the five-year training course for scout leaders. Certificates are awarded by the Boy Scouts of America to all those who complete the work. A. W. Allen of Asheville, scout executive, is director and is being assisted by Fred C. Lockwood. After completion of the course, several scout troops will be organized in the Smoky Mountains District including Sylva, Franklin, Cullowhee and Highlands, Troops are already operating at Bryson City and Cherokee. Those attending the course last Thursday night from Franklin were Ed Eaton, Paul Carpenter, Harley Cabe, Arthur Flanagan, Don Young, J. D. Franks, Dick Slagle, R. R. Smithwick, James B. Porter, J. D. Seastrunk.

**MAY 11, 1933**

***FRANKLIN BOY SCOUTS TO MEET SATURDAY***

The Smoky Mountains Boy Scout district, Daniel Boone Council, will hold its annual spring Scout-O-Ral in Franklin Saturday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock. All councils in the Smoky Mountains district will have representatives to take part in the score or more of events, which are to be, contested that afternoon. The events will take place at the baseball field south of the depot here.

Some of the events for the afternoon are as follows: Knots relay, fire building and string burning, barrel hitch relay, tent pitching, chariot race, antelope race, flag relay, bucket brigade, and inspection.

The present troop of boy Scouts in Franklin was organized about two months ago with J. D. Franks as Scoutmaster. The boys of the Franklin troop have been advancing rapidly in Scout work during these two months.

**NOVEMBER 23, 1933**

***SCOUT EMBLEMS TO BE AWARDED***

***COURT OF HONOR TO BE HELD FRIDAY NIGHT AT SCOUT HOUSE***

Franklin Boy Scout troop will hold a court of honor in the Scout house back of the Masonic Hall at 7:30 o'clock, Friday night when scout emblems will be awarded to those who have earned them.

A. W. Allen of Asheville, Scout executive of the Smoky Mountains district, is expected to be present for the court of honor. Names of those who are to receive the emblems have not been announced.

The Franklin Boy Scout troop was organized about a year ago with Don Young, a former Eagle Scout as Scoutmaster, and J. D. Franks as assistant Scoutmaster. The troop now has 24 members and many other boys are clamoring for membership.

Parents of the scouts and all others interested in Scout activities have been invited to attend the court of honor Friday night.

*FEBRUARY 15, 1934*

*SCOUTS SEEK TO AID NEEDY*

*UNDER TAKE RELIEF PROJECT AT REQUEST OF PRESIDENT ROOSEVELT*

In response to a project assigned to the Scouts of the nation by President Roosevelt in a radio broadcast 'Saturday Noon, Franklin Boy Scouts have launched a campaign to collect unused clothing, bedding and discarded furniture, which will be put into good condition and distributed to needy families through the county relief organization.

The Scouts gathered in the Scout hall to hear the president's message. It was the high point of their celebration of the 24th annual Scout Week.

The Chief executive asked every Scout to do everything possible in their separate localities to collect such household furnishings, bedding and clothing as people maybe able to spare as gifts to those who greatly need them. "I am Confident" he added, "that the American people will generously cooperate and respond."

The Franklin Scouts plan to make a door to door canvass to get gifts of clothing and furniture in fulfillment of this project. Miss Rachel Davis, director of the relief organization which will supervise distribution of the articles to the needy, said the

following things were most badly needed: Baby clothing, stockings, dresses, overcases and sweaters, trousers. Only clothing that may be repaired so that it may be worn is desired.

*MARCH 28, 1935*

*SCOUTS WILL RUN FRANKLIN*

*TO TAKE OVER REINS OF LOCAL GOVERNMENT SATURDAY*

March 29th is the second anniversary of the founding of the present troop of Boy Scouts in Franklin. Permission has been given for the boys to fill the town offices for a while on Saturday afternoon, and at the troop meeting on Friday the boys will be elected to fill the various town officer's positions from mayor to scavenger. This experiment will prove of untold value in furthering the training of the boys in good citizenship and giving them an insight into the ramifications of city government. In connection with the anniversary, a father and son banquet is being planned for Thursday of next week when speeches will be given by prominent Scouters from Asheville. This will be held in the Rotary Hall. A Scout play will be given in the courthouse on Friday, April 5 at 8 p.m. Further announcements of these functions will appear next week.

The attention of all is directed to exhibits of Scout work and collections to be found in the window of Perry's Drugstore.

*APRIL 11, 1935*

*SCOUT COMEDY IS PRESENTED*

*TROOP TO PRESENT PLAY AGAIN AT COURTHOUSE TONIGHT*

In connection with the second anniversary of the Franklin Troop of Boy Scouts a father and son banquet was held in the Rotary Hall Tuesday of last week. Some fifty-five fathers and sons gathered for the event.

A. W. Allen, scout executive of the Daniel Boone council, spoke a few words of greeting and the address of the evening was given by Harry W. Love, of Asheville, president of the council. In his remarks the speaker dwelt on the character essential in scouting and in life and urged closer unity and cooperation fathers and sons. Everyone voted the evening a success and we look forward to making this an annual event.

The mothers of the boys provided the necessary victuals and took charge of the kitchen arrangements. The Girl Scouts made excellent waitresses. During the evening a toast, "Our Dads," was given by Milton Sanders and Roy C. Dady responded with one to "Our Boys."

At the close a vote of thanks was proposed by Bobbie Brown to all who had helped make the evening a success and this was carried by acclamation. The Boy Scout comedy "After Dark" was given at the courthouse on Friday and was much appreciated by those who turned out.

*APRIL 14, 1935*

*SCOUTS RUN TOWN 2 HOURS,*

*MAKE SUGGESTIONS TO BOARD*

Despite rain, which started just as the boys took over the town for two hours last Saturday, the scouts were able to get an insight into town management and government. The various officers were duly sworn in by Jim Hauser promptly 2 o'clock. Billie Wilkie made a fine chief of police; Billy Blaine was fire chief but there were no fires; Bert Hall was city engineer, Frank Higdon, town clerk; Verco Watkins, health officer, Boone Leach, town attorney; Andrew Jones and Bobby Brown sanitary squad. The names of the mayor and town appear below. In accordance with the new law, six alderman were elected. The mayor's court was kept busy the whole of the two hours trying various small offenses and imposing fines in varying degree. Much is to be said of the generosity and cooperation with which everyone entered into the spirit of the occasion.

At the close to the time the newly elected town board met and drew up the following memorandum, which was delivered to Mayor Sisk.

We the undersigned, being duly sworn in as officers of the Town of Franklin from 2 until 4 p. m. on Saturday March 30, 1935, have examined the town and find that all is being run satisfactorily by the regular officers. With joy we again turn over the reins to the proper authorities and beg leave to make the following recommendations:

1. That the mayor, being so much worked, more time shall be given him to engage in golf and that proper transportation to the club and a congenial partner to be supplied at all times.

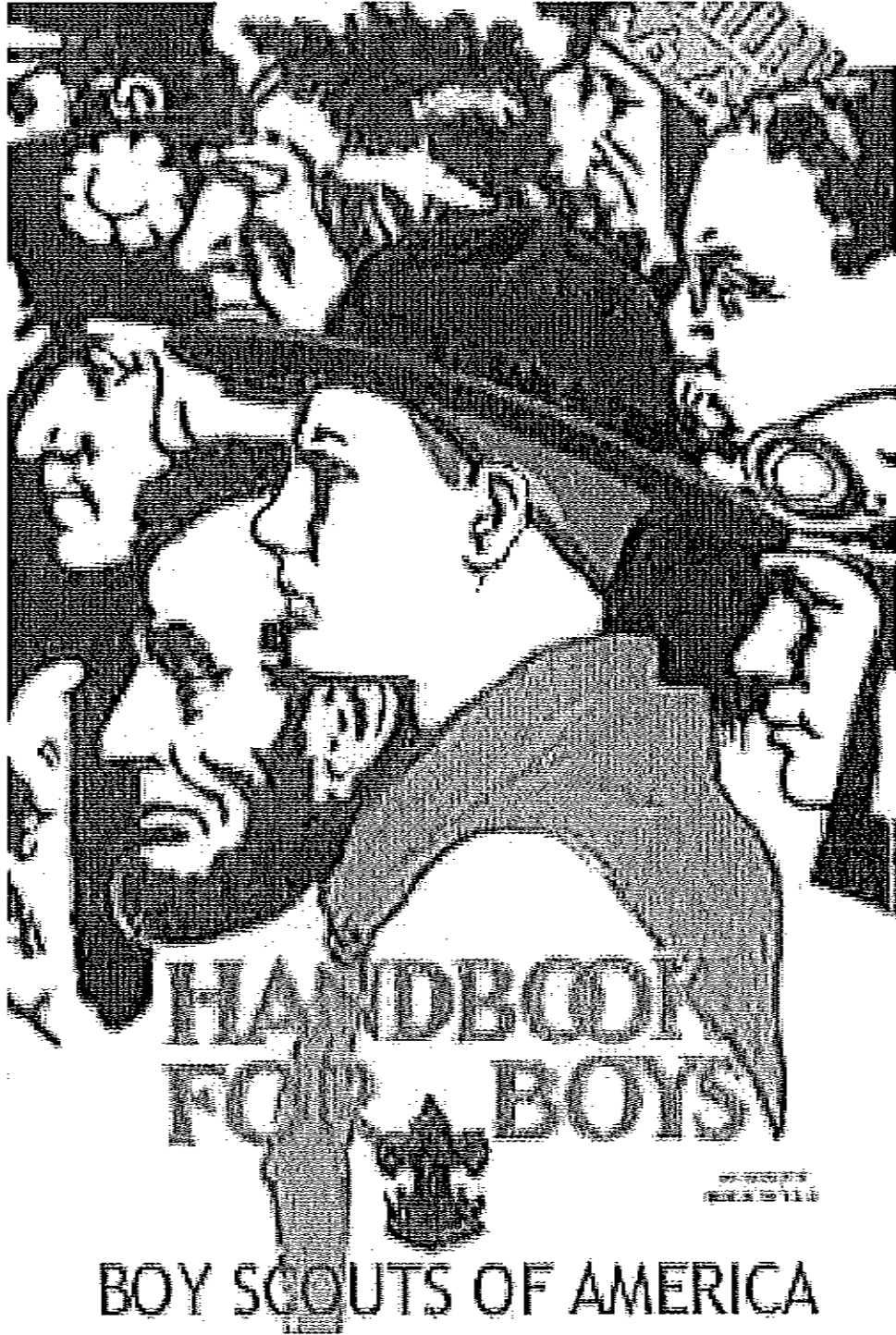


2. That a higher chair be supplied to the town clerk so that he may with more comfort rest his legs upon his desk.
3. That the town should have more early morning fires so that every citizen might derive the lasting benefits of the early morning air.
4. The moving pictures be open to all Scouts free at least once a weekend any boy not availing himself of this favor be called for with a car and the proper reason ascertained.
5. That the sanitary squad use more diligence in collecting garbage and reach every house before the telephone can call them.
6. The courthouse be kept cleaner and that it particularly be scrubbed before the Scout play next Friday.
7. That we have more loafer benches in the town so that so many do not have to stand around the streets.
8. That the new post office be provided with a large lobby lined with plush seats so that the C. C. C. boys and their sparks may have pleasanter evenings.
9. That an efficiency expert be appointed and that he put unbreakable glass in all fireboxes to cut down the cost of the fire department.
10. That a timekeeper be appointed and that he be instructed to keep all four faces of the Town Clock at the same time.
11. That the health officer be requested to oust the "flu" germ before next winter.

12. That the store-keepers install more awnings so that we can keep dry on wet days.

In conclusion we would like to thank the town for this opportunity of service and their cooperation in our efforts. It has been a pleasant experience for us all.

*SCOUT PROGRESS*

*MARKED BY PLANS FOR NEW TROOP AND SCOUT HOUSE*

Building of a new scout house and the organization of Boy Scout troop for colored boy of Franklin are among the plans today which mark the progress of scouting in Franklin.

"Due to the interest and cooperation of Franklin citizens," says, J. S. Conley, district financial chairman of the Boy Scouts, "a new building is assured for the boys in the near future. Bids for its construction are being asked for now, and construction details are in the hands of the construction committee which consists of A. B. Slagle, Oscar Bryant and G. L. Houk."

The colored troop that is being organized will have its final registration this week. The one other troop of colored scouts in this district is located in Sylva. This troop is being assisted in its planning by a recently appointed group of Franklin who form the Scout committee of Troop 1 of Franklin. Members are Ben McGlamery, chairman, Charles Melichar, E. J. Whitmire, and T. T. Love.

Camping for Boy and Girl Scouts received impetus when the Lumpkin cabin near Arrowood Glade was given to all Scouts of the Southern Region. It was placed under the management of a board of trustees of which Dr. J. E. Perry and Mrs H. E. Church are the local representatives.

At the present time one other project is under development. When it is finished, the Scouts of the Daniel Boone Council will have a summer camp of their own.

There are 28 boys enrolled in the Franklin Troop 1 under the leadership of Jimmy Hauser, assisted by the Revs. J. L. Stokes II, and Rufus Morgan. Progress of the boys in scouting can be noted in the fact that the Franklin Troop has achieved more awards and honors than any other troop of the district. Eagle Scout rank has been awarded 11 members of the troop.

*FEBRUARY 12, 1942*

*SCOUT WEEK*

*WITNESSES TO PROGRESS OF SCOUTING IN MACON*

The Franklin troop of Boy Scouts observed the first day of Boy Scout Week by attending the Scout-O-Rall at Cullowhee last Friday evening. They were accompanied by the Rev. J. L. Stokes, Rev. A. R. Morgan and Hubert Wardlaw. The Franklin Troop 1 and the Chapel School troop attended the Methodist Church on Sunday morning, and heard an inspiring sermon by Dr. Stokes on the subject of "The Great Chief."

The boy Scouts put on a realistic rehearsal of a black out for the Lions Club after they had been entertained at dinner at Panorama Court. Siren and bomb explosions were followed by a demonstration for First Aid to the "wounded."

Help in defense activities by the troop includes the collection of books for the Victory Book drive and waste paper. There are 35 boys enrolled in this troop.

The Chapel School troop is also collecting waste paper. The troop has a membership of 11.

A new troop has been organized by the Rev. R. W. Williams at Etna with a membership of 12. The troop at Highlands is reported to have a membership of 12.

*FEBRUARY 11, 1943*

*BOY SCOUT WEEK TO BE OBSERVED;*

*DRIVE NEXT WEEK*

Boy Scout week will be observed February 14 to 20. The Franklin troops will unite with those in the nation in celebrating this annual event.

Rev. Dr. J. L. Stokes II will lead the local drive, when the annual adult membership dues are collected by the Franklin Scout committee. There will be a special service for the Franklin scouts at the Methodist church next Sunday evening when Dr. W. L. Hutchins, district superintendent, will be the preacher.

*War Work Commended*

In recent months scouts have gathered tons of scrap, thousands of books and aided the war effort in countless other ways.

Col. Venable of the General Staff of the War Department stated recently, "It is a pleasure to receive men into the service who have had Scout training because you know they have a clear cut idea of right and wrong. They live cleanly, they are independent, yet know the value of cooperation. They know the woods and the heavens, how to use a compass, how to cook and generally take care of themselves, and how to do things with their hands."

**JANUARY 24, 1946**

***NEGRO SCOUTS TO COLLECT FUNDS FOR DRIVE***

The following Boy Scouts from the Franklin Negro Troop have been elected to collect donations from the Negro citizens of Macon County for the infantile paralysis drive: J. D. Shepard, Alfred Thomas, Charles Gibson, Leonard Wykle, David Patterson, and Franklin Greenwood.

These Scouts will make their collection Saturday and Sunday, January 26 and 27.

**FEBRUARY 28, 1946**

***NEW SCOUT TROOP TO GET CHARTER AT CEREMONY SUNDAY***

A charter is to be presented to the newly organized Boy Scout troop No. 6, Franklin, in a special service at Carson Chapel Church next Sunday night, March 3, at 7:30.

In a candle light service talks are to be made by the Rev. Rufus Morgan, who is chairman of the Smoky Mountain Council, and by John D. Alsup, commissioner for the Cub Scouts. The charter presentation and the investiture of the tenderfoot Scouts will be made by Scout Commissioner James Hauser.

**MARCH 28, 1946**

***CHARTER PRESENTED NEGRO BOY SCOUT TROOP***

The local Negro Boy Scout Troop was presented its charter as a court of honor ceremony Sunday night at which three boys were promoted to second class Scouts.

The meeting was held at Ray's Chapel church, and the charter was presented by Francis C. Smith of Asheville, assistant Scout executive of the Daniel Boone Council; who also led the tenderfoot investiture. W. E. Hunnicutt, local Scout official, and Eagle Scout James Cunningham also participated in the program.

The meeting was opened with a devotional program, led by Viola Lenoir, president of the Negro Parent-Teacher association, which sponsors the Negro Troop.

Walter Stewart, Isaiah Coleman, and J. D. Shepard are the boys who were promoted to second class. Robert Scruggs, Avery Stewart and Merlyn Chavis became tenderfoot Scouts.

*JUNE 27, 1946*

*CHARLIE SLAGLE DIES OF INJURY*

Charlie Weimar Slagle was doing the work he loved best when he was fatally injured by a bull last Saturday.

And when his flag draped casket was borne into the Franklin Methodist Church Monday. It was placed where the flag draped casket of another youthful war veteran was to stand just two days later. Both had died Sunday as a result of accident.

Mr. Slagle loved the farm, and loved best of all, perhaps the farm animals. So it was the natural thing for him to start back to work on his father's farm, when he returned to Franklin about six months ago from service in the armed forces.

And his friends said of him that is was characteristic of him that, when the bull had to be led from his stall, he did it himself rather than having a farm employee do it.



The animal gored him in the abdomen, and he died of infection at the Angel Hospital Sunday evening at 8 o'clock. He was 25.

Though quiet and unassuming in remarkable degree, he had become active, in the short he had been back home, in a variety of community efforts. He was commander of the American Legion post, a Mason, member of the Franklin Methodist Church, and a Rotarian. He was also Scoutmaster of a recently organized rural Boy Scout Troop, and each Wednesday evening after Rotary, went into the country to the weekly troop meeting. As a boy he became an Eagle Scout member of the Franklin Troop.

After graduation from Franklin High School and studying agriculture at N. C. State College, he joined the army air forces, and served from June 1942 to September 1945. He spent about two years in the European Theater.

***AUGUST 8, 1946***

***SLAGLE TO BUILD SCOUT HOUSE OF NATIVE STONE AS MEMORIAL TO SON***

A. B. Slagle will build a Scout house on top of the wooded hill just west of the Nantahala Creamery as a memorial to his son, Charlie W. Slagle, and will donate the hill and the house for the use of the Franklin Boy Scouts.

The announcement was made at Wednesday evenings meeting of the Rotary club, of which young Mr. Slagle was a member, by H. W. Cabe, member of the Rotary Committee appointed several weeks ago to seek a site for a Scout house.

Mr. Slagle also has in mind use of the structure as a community building by other public groups, Mr. Cabe explained.

Charlie W. Slagle, who died June 23 as a result of an accident, was one of the first two Macon County boys to become Eagle Scouts, the highest rank in scouting.

In the Slagle home on West Main Street is a small statue of a Boy Scout, kneeling to take the Scout pledge. It was presented to Charlie Slagle at the time he became an Eagle Scout, and when the memorial building is completed, this little statue will be placed somewhere in the Scout House.

**DECEMBER 5, 1946**

*SLAGLE MEMORIAL HILL TO HONOR WAR DEAD TOO, UNDER TERMS OF TRUST*

The wooded hill just back of the Nantahala Creamery will become the a memorial to Macon county dead of two World Wars, while the beautiful stone building being constructed on the crest of the hill will stand as a memorial to Charlie Slagle under the terms of a trust agreement put on record in the register of deeds office Monday.

In an agreement, A. B. Slagle and wife, Addie , who are effecting the structure to memorialize their son, convey the hill to a board of trustees, and Macon County Post No. 108. American Legion assigns \$9,000 to the same trustees.

Such of the Legion funds as are required for the purpose are to be used to erect a caretaker's home on the property, and the agreement provides that the entire plot is to be known as the "Veterans Memorial Park", commemorating the soldier dead of this county of both World Wars.

One of the purposes of the agreement was to set forth the terms under which the Legion is to use funds received from the recent sale of its building on West Main street to construct the caretakers home.

Members of the board of trustees are named in the agreement as follows; Harold Enloe, representing the legion post for a term of six years; A. B. Slagle, representing Junaluska Lodge No. 145, A. F. and A.M. for two years; John Archer representing Macon county troops of the Boy Scouts of America four years; Erwin Patton, representing the A. B. Slagle family, eight years; and G. L. Houk, as county superintendent of schools, for so long as he holds that office.

***JUNE 17, 1948***

***FOUR NEGRO SCOUTS HERE ARE PROMOTED TO SECOND CLASS***

Four Negro boys, members of Franklin's Boy Scout Troop number 11, were promoted to second class at a Smoky Mountain district court of honor for Negroes held June 7.

The second class awards were presented by the Rev. J. T. Kennedy, Negro clergyman of Asheville, formerly of Franklin. The four local boys who became second class are Roy Chavis, Frederick Stewart, Rudolph Gibson and Marilyn Chavis.

***AUGUST 12, 1948***

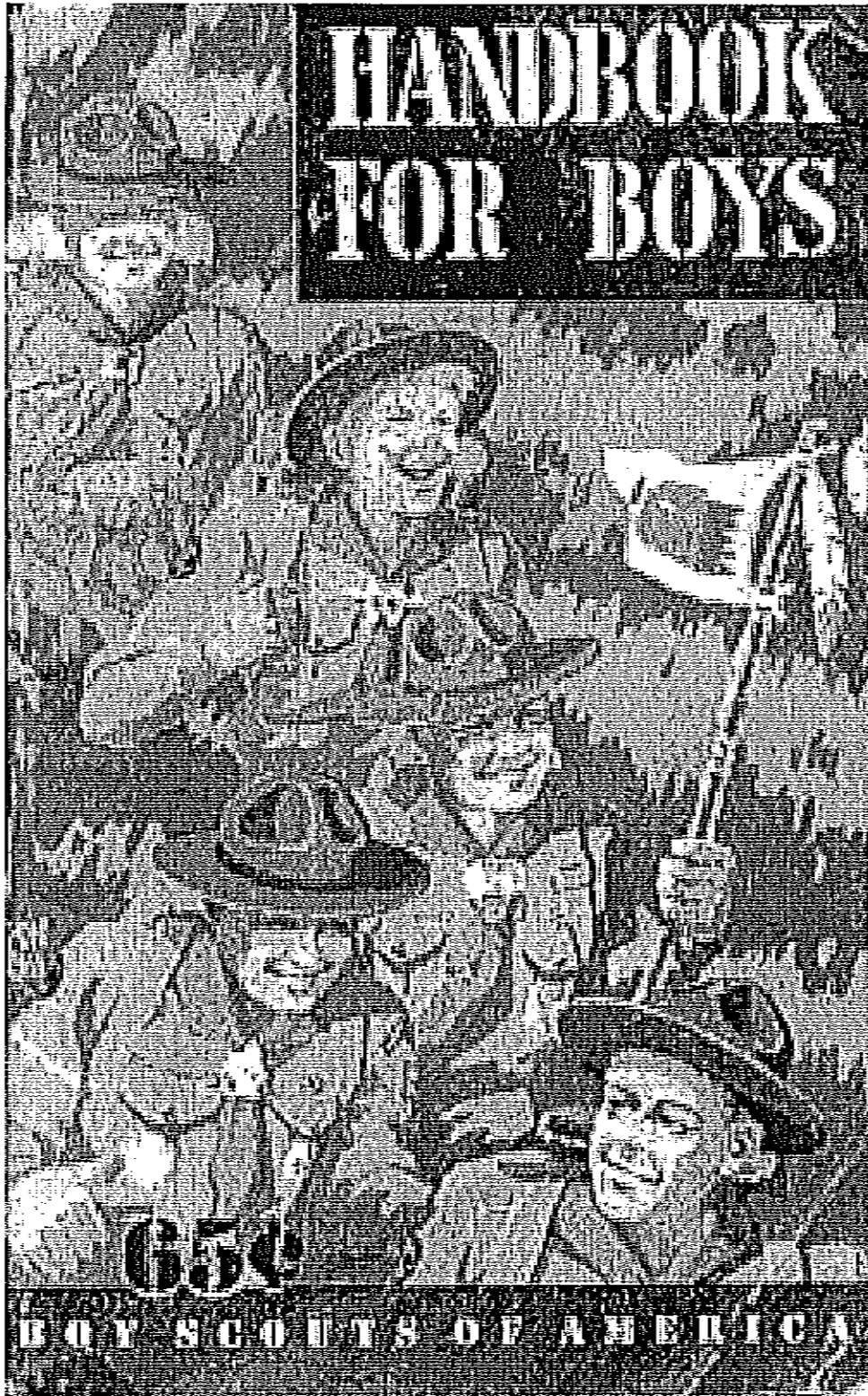
attending the camp. The weekend Order of the Arrow session was attended only by boys in this district elected to the order and by old members.

Another Franklin Scout, Eagle Ben Edwards, is the chief of the Order of the Arrow lodge, which is made up of the 14 counties of the Daniel Boone Council in Western North Carolina.

*SEPTEMBER 30, 1954*

*'OPERATION LOST' SUCCESSFUL FOR ALL*

*BUT 'AMOS' AND 'OSCAR'*

Somewhere in the rough and wooly underbrush near Cowee Bald "Amos" and "Oscar" are still awaiting rescue.

And alas! They'll just have to keep on waiting and hoping that some hunter will happen upon them this season.

In this way: "Amos" and "Oscar" are the two dummies who figured prominently in "Operation Lost"; a realistic exercise staged by some 25 Explorer Scouts of the Smoky Mountain District Saturday. The whole idea was to give the Scouts valuable experience in organizing and executing search procedure in the mountains so they can help look for the inevitable several who become lost each year in the mountainous region.

The Scouts gained valuable experience. But they were unable to locate hide or hair of "Amos" and "Oscar", who were unceremoniously dumped from an airplane the night before the exercise in the rugged undergrowth in the vicinity of the Cowee Bald lookout tower.

For better than five hours the Scouts systematically combed the tower area to no avail.

However the fact that they were unable to locate the dummies did not infringe upon the success of the exercise and it was termed highly gratifying by Boy Scout Officials, including A. W. Allen, of Asheville, executive of the Daniel Boone Council.

At a special supper given the searchers by the Lions Club at the Holly Springs community Building, R. E. McKelvey, of Franklin, district chairman, commented on the

roughness of the Cowee terrain and declared, "I think it was worth more to us than if we had found them (the dummies), because it impresses upon us that finding a lost person in the mountains is a tough job."

The chairman said the inability to locate the dummies proved that such a venture, a real one, calls for advance organization and planning.

"More than 25 of you boys spent the day in the woods searching," Mr. McKelvey pointed out, "and all of you came out . . . that alone proves you had organization."

In a brief speech complimenting the Scouts who came from Macon, Jackson and Swain troops, B. B. Scott disclosed, "We picked the roughest territory to give you training . . . success did not hinge on locating the dummies.

Mr. Scott, who is district camping chairman and was in charge of "Operation Lost", presented participation certifications to the Scouts. Tom Speed, of Sylva, Scout field executive, offered his congratulations and announced plans for organizing a mobilization plan among the Scouts in the near future so they will be able to join searching parties on short notice.

The Scouts cultivated a lot of respect for Cowee Bald by the end of the day.

One boy summed it up this way: "Anyone crazy enough to get lost in there deserves to stay in there."

Quipped another, when asked if he has found a dummy: "I was lucky to get myself out of there."

Said still another when asked the same question: "Yeah! Three of 'em," indicating himself and his two pals, with a knowing finger.

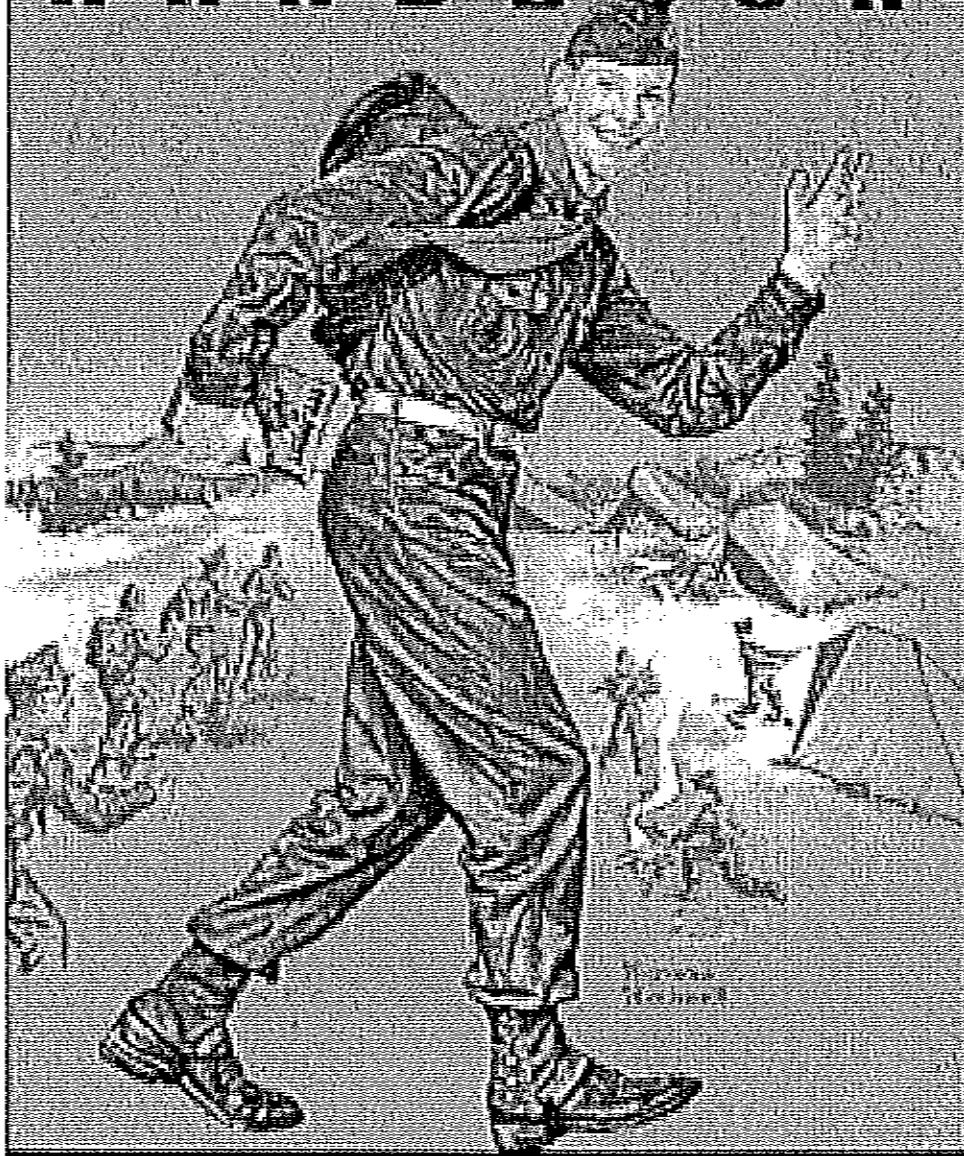
Earlier the Scouts were guests of the men at supper.

*BOY SCOUTING CAME TO FRANKLIN IN THE 30'S;*

*HAUSER HAS 13 YEAR'S SERVICE AS LEADER*

Boy Scouting came to Franklin in the early 30's with a fully active troop carrying out the program by 1933.

Scout leaders back then recall it took a couple of years to the movement really underway.

In '33 a 21-member troop (Troop 1) was active under the leadership of J. D. Franks.

Members of this troop were Paul Ader, Brabson Bulgin, Joe Duncan, Elmond Daby, Frank Higdon, Frank Jamison, John Lancaster, Fred Murray, Willard Pendergrass, James Perry, C. L. Potts, Bob Porter, Charles Slagle, John Slagle, Henry Sprinkle, Bert Hall, Boone Leach, Charles Palmer, Lyle Palmer, Milton Saunders, and Virco Watkins.

Franklin had this one troop until 1955, when it was divided and Troop 21 chartered with the Rev. Bryan Hatchett and Dr. J. H. Hill as Scoutmasters. Troop 1 is sponsored by the Rotary Club and Troop 21 by the Presbyterian Men's Club.

In the 22-year history of Troop 1, James L. Hauser has 13 years service as Scoutmaster. He served from 1937 to 1944, and from 1950 through 1954, when Bill Garrison took over.

In addition to Mr. Franks, the first, and Mr. Hauser other Scoutmasters and the years they served include Jess Conley ('35), J. A. Flanagan ('36), John Edwards ('45 and '46), H. A. Wilhide ('48), and Robert E. Lee ('49).

Assistant Scoutmasters over the years have been Don Young, Paul Carpenter, Jim Hauser, C. C. Herbert, D. W. Nichols, W. E. Furr, Walton R. Smith, E. J. Whitmire, the Rev. Rufus Morgan, J. L. Stokes, II, Carl Stokes, John Edwards, Russell McKelvey, Charles Hunnicutt, Robert E. Lee, Frank I. Murray, Jr., and Dr. G. R. McSween.

*FEBRUARY 23, 1956*

*HANDBOOK AND KETTLES*

*1ST SCOUTMASTER LOOKS BACK*

Gilmer A Jones still has "somewhere around the house" a battered handbook and a couple of kettles. They're mementos to Franklin's first Boy Scout troop, which was organized in 1915. Mr. Jones was Scoutmaster.

Back in those days, he recalls, Boy scouting had no national affiliation of today's scope. No one seems to remember if the troop here ever had a number.

"It was a voluntary movement . . . more of an idea than anything" the Franklin attorney commented in an interview this week. J. A. Porter did more than anyone individual to get the troop started, he said.

Charter members included, there are no records so the list may be incomplete, T. W. Angel, Edgar Angel, Lee Barnard, R. S. Jones, Allen Siler, Jeronimo Ray, Gilmer Crawford, Dean Simpson, Ballard Bryson, Quince Hauser, Tracy Barnard and Steve Porter.

*Course is Rough*

From this first year the course of Boy scouting ran rough in Franklin. Charters were allowed to expire and troops turned inactive. Up to the early 30's when scouting

smoothed out and charters were renewed annually. New troops of scouts came along at intervals under the leadership of the Reverend Jerome Pipes, Gilmer T. Crawford, T. B. Hayes and J. D. Franks and possibly others.

#### *First Eagle Scouts*

It was not until 1936 that Franklin had its first Eagle Scouts. At the same Court of Honor, Gilmer Andrew Jones and Charlie Slagle attained the Eagle Rank.

***May 30, 1957***

#### *DISTRICT BOY SCOUTS ATTEND CAMPOREE AT BIG LAUREL AREA*

Pup tents and boy Scouts swarmed over Macon County's widely known camping ground, Big Laurel, on Cowee Bald, May 17 – 19 for a district wide camporee.

Some 125 Scouts and leaders were on hand for the three-day outing.

The camporee was patrol camping event, designed to improve the patrol method of camping within troops according to Francis Pless, of Sylva, district field executive. Patrols – basic units of Boy Scouting – were graded on their camping ability and were judged by standards established by the National Camping Service, he said.

Mr. Pless said citations were awarded patrols completing extra projects in "Scoutcraft".

He is patrol leader of the Rebel Patrol of Franklin's Troop 1. Mrs. Crawford took Johnny to Sylva where he joined two other Scouts for the jamboree trip.

Participating in the service were Dr. J. L. Hill, the Rev. Hunnicutt, and B. L. McGlamery. The Scouts are Fred Bulgin, Charles Slagle, Doug Slagle, Dennis Vinson and Doug Vinson.

***FEBRUARY 6, 1958***

***LOCAL SCOUT LEADER AWARDED SILVER BEAVER***

B. L. McGlamery of Franklin was awarded the Silver Beaver at the Daniel Boone Council's annual recognition dinner in Asheville January 13 for his long and faithful service to the Boy Scouts.

He is Smoky Mountain District finance chairman. This is the highest award made to a councilor.

The trip will include a bus tour of Chicago en route to Colorado Springs. 10 days at the jamboree and bus tours of Dallas, TX and New Orleans, LA and a steamboat ride on the Mississippi River on the trip home.

These Scouts from Franklin will join 53,000 other Scouts from the United States and foreign countries for the jamboree.

While at Colorado Springs the boys will tour several points of interest including Pike's Peak and the Air Force Academy, and will hear prominent guest speakers on the subject of Scouting.

Scouts Benny Swafford, Tommy Crawford, Johnny Crawford, and Paul Cabe each gave accounts of different aspects of the Colorado Jamboree, which was attended by Scouts from all states and several foreign countries.

A camporee for all Scouts of the Daniel Boone Council, of which the Smoky Mountain District is a part, is planned for September 30 – October 2 at Hominy Valley, near Enka. Some 1000 to 1200 Scouts, including a number from, Macon County troops, are expected to visit the camporee.

It was announced that a new troop has been organized in the Cartoogechaye community with Lonnie Crawford as Scoutmaster and Dr. Rufus A. Morgan as institutional representative.

The need for more cooperation by parents was stressed, especially in respect to the younger boys of Scout age.

### ***Conclusion***

During the first 45 years of Scouting in Macon County Troops were organized and charters expired. The spirit of scouting, however, was never allowed to die. Scouters and Scouts alike, dedicated to the principals of scouting, have been among our most prominent and influential citizens, a tradition that continues to this day.

Since the time of leaders such as Gilmer Jones, J. D. Franks and James Hauser, the Scouts of Macon County have always been prepared to serve their city, state and country. From collecting for the needy during the depression, aiding in the fight of infantile paralysis in the 40's, to training and cooperating with emergency and civil defense agencies, our Scouts have been there.

This history is dedicated to the Scouters of Macon County who know and understand the needs of their community, and have the courage and conviction to serve.
