## DISTRICT CUB SCOUT CAMP OUT

This paper will show how I used a cub and parent camp out as a successful recruiting tool. I hope other districts will see this as an effective way to reach more young boys for scouting.

After discussing the Cub Scout Camp Out with my district executive and my council executive, I was asked to try this camp out as a pilot program for the Blue Ridge Council. If it was successful as a recruiting tool, the council would adopt the program for the other eight districts as an annual Fall Roundup event.

As chairman of the camp out, I recruited an assistant chairman, four people to assist with registration, five cubmasters to bring a suitable game for the camp out and to be in charge of instructing the game on Saturday. I selected Camp Lou Ann for the site and secured permission from Midway Presbyterian Church. I then set the date for October 21 - 22, 1988 with registration beginning at 5:00 p.m. I held a program planning meeting with the staff, where we determined a budget. We decided we wanted to have a drawing for door prizes. These prizes would be camping equipment donated from local merchants. I then arranged with Wometoo of Anderson to cater the breakfast. I secured a printer to print numbered meal tickets and we used the stubs for the prize drawing. At this point, the committee agreed to a fee of \$5.00 per person for the camp out.

I promoted the campout at the Fall School Night Roundups, Council newsletter in September and October, Roundtables, Commissioner Service, local newspaper, and mail outs to every Cub Scout and unit leader.

On October 21 and 22nd, Six & Twenty District of the Blue Ridge Council held a Cub Scout Camp Out at Camp Lou Ann in Anderson, S. C. Approximately 165 parents, cub scouts and staff participated.

After registration and setting up of tents, Boy Scout Troop 84 under the direction of Scoutmaster Chess Martin and three of his boy scouts entertained the cub scouts and their parents with skits and songs. After the campfire, the cubs roasted marshmallows. While the cubs were roasting their marshmallows, the committee had a staff meeting to review plans for Saturday. After our catered breakfast, we were entertained by a local hobby shop. They demonstrated remote controlled air planes. Then we separated into groups and participated in games using the "Round Robin" system. After the games were completed, the tents were removed and a final clean-up was performed.

By noon, we were ready for the recognition ceremony and to award the patches, certificates and camping prizes.

Because we were able to tell the Cub Scouts at the school nights about the camp out, this enabled us to sign up more new cubs this year than last year. Our total number of cub scouts in our district was up by a 100+ over last year. When new cubs enroll in Scouts, the first thing they ask, is when are we going camping. By having this camp out already planned, we were able to give them a date and all the details at their school night.

After critiquing the Cub Scout Camp Out, my conclusion was the campout was very successful as a recruiting tool and also for having a lot of fun for both parents and cub scouts. Numerous parents wanted to have another camp out in the Spring. However, the committee decided against this because it would not be effective for a recruiting tool if we used it any time except in the Fall.

I am attaching a guideline that my committee and I have put together for any other district or council who would like to use a Cub Scout Camp Out for a tool for recruiting. I am also enclosing a copy of the flier and a copy of the meal ticket.

# THE DISTRICT CUB SCOUT CAMPOUT

# What is a Cub Scout Campout?

A "simple" campout for the Cub Scout and an adult 21 years of age or older. ( Note: not for Tiger Cubs of Boy Scouts.)

# Why should a Cub Scout campout be held?

1. As a tool to excite boys into the cub program!

2. To get that cub who did not participate in pack summer activities enthused into getting back into his den.

. To make cub leaders feel the district is supporting them

with quality programs.

4. To help sway that parent who is "riding the fence", on whether to take a leadership position. Also, to show the parent how much fun cub scouting is.

. To provide a well planned overnight outdoor camping

experience for the parent and son.

# When is the Cub Scout Campout held?

This campout is generally held a couple of weeks after all the schools in the district have had their Fall Roundup and the new leaders have been trained. It should occur somewhere between the last of September and the first of October on a Friday evening through Saturday till noon. SIMPLE!

# What theme should be used for the Cub Scout Campout?

Any theme may be used. Let the imagination of your chairman and his committee take over. They may use the September or October Cub Scout Program Helps! The committee may use an Indian theme or Halloween theme, a Fun in the Woods theme or a Carnival theme!

# What do we consider when planning a Cub Scout Campout?

1. How many participants expected (Adults & Cubs)

2. Staff Needs

5. Activities schedule (campfire, games, etc.)

6. Breakfast (a most important part of the campout)

7. Facilities needed ( bathrooms, tents, buildings, etc.

3. Registration and fee collection.

9. Promotion (Council news letter, telephone, letters, leader training, roundtables, school nights and unit commissioners)

10. Cost per participant.

11. Recognition needs (patches, ribbons, door prizes, certificates)

12. Checkout procedures

## That sort of recognition should we give?

To the staff - certificates of appreciation, thank you notes, and/or special home made awards.

To the participants - patches (given only to the Cub), certificates of participation, ribbons, and/or home made awards. To the institution who allows us to use their facilities - a special

thank you letter.

#### GAMES

The following games were used effectively at the Cub Scout Campouts:

### TENNIS BALL THROW

- Dad's throw: 5 throws at 50 feet. Cub's throw: 5 throws at 50 feet.
- The throw is underhanded and into a 18" square hole in a box.
- Total points will be parent plus cub and recorded in cub's box on the sheet ie., parent 2

2 4 (enter on sheet)

## 3-LEGGED SOCCERBALL RACE

- 11: Parent and cub will pair up and race 25 yards, turn around the cones and race 25 yards back to the start/finish.
- 2. Use parent and cub joint leg to move the soccerball.
- 3. 5 pairs of parents and cubs for each race and runoff, or less.

# 75 YARD RELAY WITH SPOON AND SOFTBALL

- Cub starts and runs 25 yards down, rounds cones and runs 25 yards back to tag parent, who then runs the last 25 yards to finish (if ball is dropped, stop and put it back on spoon and run again from there).
- 5 pairs of parents and cubs for each race and run off races or less.
- OBSTACLE COURSE - A noncompetitive game or can be timed. Rope crawl unders, tires, barrels to crawl through etc.
- WHEEL BARROW RACE Parent holds cubs legs while cub races on hands with parent pushing for 15 yards.
- BLIND OBSTACLE COURSE With Parent blindfolded, cub instructs verbally on how to go through obstacle course. The then switch places!
- FRISBEE THROW Each contestant gets 5 throws for points.
- CHANGE CLOTHES RACE One cub at start has to put on ladies dress & accessories and race 25 yds., derobe and have parent dress up 7 race back 25 yds.

Use your imagination on games - Many games may be found in Cub program helps.

#### SIX & THENTY CUB SCOUT CAMPOUT
